

A RARE FIND

While doing a site survey this past May in Mineral County, Nevada, archeologist Jeff Markos discovered a dusty, rotted wallet in the sand. The name on the driver's license was unreadable, but \$550 in cash, some credit cards and a health insurance card with a California address belonging to a Richard Dixon were intact.

Archeologists are part detective, so Markos went to work. He called the credit-card issuers, the health insurance company and even the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department, all to no avail. Finally, Michele Di Chiara, an assistant with the Sparks, Nev., police, checked motor-vehicle records and located a Richard Dixon in Huntsville, Utah.

A call was placed, and Markos got on the line. It took the 62-year-old Dixon a minute to get over the shock. "I lost that wallet during a motorcycle race in 1982," he said. And now someone had gone to all this trouble to track him down
