Steve has three children; all graduated from major universities: Ohio State, Bowling Green State, and University of Toledo.


Steve has been and continues to be involved in his church, working on finances and other projects. He Coached grade school basketball for eight years at his church.

LAMBERTVILLE — The Bedford Rural Ag Kicking Mules showed the home folks Friday night they again will be a power in the Southeastern Michigan Conference this year as they took an impressive 27-6 victory over the Hillsdale Hornets in the first conference game of the season.

The Mules, defending champions in the league, completely bottled up the Hillsdale attack except for one 60-yard scoring dash, and on offense used wide end sweeps and accurate long

Rollman went around left end from the 7 to rack up the extra point and put Bedford ahead 7-0.

Hillsdale's bid to knot the screw was foiled when a bad pass from center prevented the try for the extra point.
